<p>Power is held by one central authority. The central authority has all the power to make laws and decisions for the people.</p>	<p>Voluntary association of independent states that make their own laws and decisions, but are loosely aligned to a weak central government</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Have some common purpose • Agree to certain limitations on their freedom • States maintain considerable independence 	<p>Power to make laws and decisions for the people is SHARED between a central authority and regional authorities</p>
